 14. They have a bright grass-green plumage (feather coverage) above and light green to bright yellow below. They have a royal blue patch on the outer wing, a bright orange patch on the lower belly and a blue bar across their forehead above the nostrils.
 15. The Northern Quoll eats several species of native frogs and also introduced Cane Toads. Cane Toads are poisonous and kill any quoll that eats them.
